Cruise Report – 4th of July at Quartermaster Harbor

When setting up the wheel it's a bit important to know how many boats are coming so you pick a large enough spot and set the first four boats at an appropriate distance to ensure you have enough room for all the other boats. According to the registrations we had about 25 boats.

So with last years Poulsbo wagon wheel fresh in his mind Tom chose a spot well away from where the fireworks barge would be to ensure that we would not have to move the wheel after it was set up as we did in Poulsbo. Twice in a row would be a sure fire Screw up award.

Next up is the on the move cruise. By the time this is printed we should be on our way north to join that trip. LaConner, Lopez, Westcott bay then Colors. From Colors we go to Todd Inlet and then finish at Victoria. From there Chris and I head north to Desolation for a couple of weeks.

Just a reminder, there is a new app from Customs and Boarder Patrol called CBP Roam that allows you to cross the boarder from Canada to the US without stopping at a point of entry. Check it out and get your boat and passengers enrolled. It allows you to add passengers on the fly unlike Nexus and the other trusted traveller programs. Below is the message on the US CBP website:

Small Vessel Reporting System (SVRS)

Small Vessel Report System (SVRS) is no longer in service and float plans will no longer be accepted.

Boaters looking for a new, faster way to report their arrival and/or apply for a registered boater program may use the CBP ROAM app, available for free on the Apple App and Google Play stores. Current SVRS registration numbers may be used within the CBP Reporting Offsite Arrival - Mobile (ROAM) for expedited processing. Boaters may also continue to report their arrival via designated telephone reporting numbers, if desired.

Michelle, our treasurer has written something about registration and payment for cruises. Please, it is important that you pay for any cruise you attend at the time of the registration either by credit card or immediately with a check to Michelle. Paying cash at the time of the cruise has caused cruise teams and our treasurer major issues with accounting. Make life easier for your board and for the cruise teams by paying early and in a way that can be easily tracked and accounted for. Credit card or check PLEASE at the time of the registration.

As many of you are aware, during the July 4th cruise to quartermaster Harbor one of our member boats burst a high-pressure transmission oil line and when his bilge pump kicked on an

unknown amount of oil was pumped into the bay. As a result there was an oil sheen that was seen by an island residents drone. That resident posted the photo of our wheel and the sheen onto a community social network page, which was forwarded to the USCG. As a result the USCG began an investigation and sent out an over flight to determine the scope and impact of the spill. That flight determined that the sheen had mostly dissipated and there was no need to dispatch any response craft to perform mitigation. There is an ongoing USCG investigation however.

The issue for the club is our reputation, as it was well known that the big wheel in the bay was the Roche Harbor Yacht Club. A number of our members received texts and emails and calls from people on the island asking what we were doing out there and were we aware of the situation.

Those of us in the wheel were unaware of the magnitude of the sheen until we saw the overhead photos. The offending boat owner took action to prevent further spills and cleaned up the oil from the bilge area and replaced the broken hose. He is also in contact with the Coast Guard investigation team.

Your commodore contacted the USCG to report what we knew about the spill and acknowledge that the spill came from one of the boats in our wagon wheel.

Your commodore then contacted the boat owner and asked him to contact the Coast Guard investigator in charge of the investigation, as they needed to know the source of the spill to complete their investigation.

Just a reminder, that as boaters we have an obligation to take care of our boating environment. It is our responsibility to ensure our boat is in good order and that we have the equipment on board to prevent spills and if there is one, that we have available to us absorbent pads and other materials to contain and minimize the impact on the environment.

Recreational boats and fishing vessels — not tankers and freighters — currently are the leading sources of known oil spills in Puget Sound. Between 2011 and 2015, recreational vessels reported spills of almost 6,000 gallons of diesel and gasoline in Washington and many go unreported. About two-thirds of these discharges are one gallon or less. Small spills, such as oily bilge discharge, accounted for an estimated 75 percent of the oil dumped into local waters over the last 10 years.

The USCG and EPA rules require that oil spills be reported to the National Response Center at 1-800-424-8802. This will ensure an appropriate and timely response.

It is also important to understand that it does not take very much oil to create a fairly large sheen. A sheen, on the water is on average, one micron thick or .0001 millimeters or the thickness of one molecule of oil. According to the EPA one cup. of oil will cover 1 acre of water. That is hard to imagine but if that is the case imagine if your bilge pump dumps a quart of oil into the bay. That is a big and very visible spill.

Penalties for spilling can be significant. Intentional dumping can carry both jail time and a hefty financial fine. Spills caused by negligence also can carry both jail time and financial fines. Accidents happen, reporting them is the right thing to do.

According to the Coast Guard investigator assigned to this spill the consequences are most likely a warning unless the source vessel has had prior contact and incidents of oil spillage from the vessel.

The RHYC board took this matter quite seriously and met on Monday following the cruise

for a short board meeting. The board drafted a letter to the Vashon Island newspaper the Beachcomber, letting them know that we were aware of the incident and that we were in contact with the USCG and were cooperating with the investigation. The paper was doing an investigative report on the spill so hopefully our pro-active stance will limit the damage to our club reputation. The letter we sent is below in this Anchor Watch.

Open letter to the citizens of Vashon Island

July 6, 2019

On July 3, 4 and 5 the Roche Harbor Yacht Club visited your beautiful island and anchored in Quartermaster Harbor to enjoy, what is in our opinion, the best fireworks display in all of Washington. We had 25 member boats and 10 from the Tacoma Yacht Club in attendance. We became aware of a situation late on Friday afternoon when someone sent us a drone photo of our great circle of boats and to our dismay there was an oil sheen spreading from the area of our location. The incident occurred when a member's boat blew a transmission oil line, which was under pressure and lost transmission oil into the bilge. Before he could absorb or contain that oil his automatic bilge pumps came on and pumped an unknown amount of oil into the bay. We contacted the USCG and reported the incident to them and are cooperating with their investigation. They conducted a flyover later in the day and noted the sheen had mostly dissipated. They then found it unnecessary to send a response boat to the scene.

We take our responsibility for caring for the pristine waters of Puget Sound very seriously and in no way want to minimize the impact to these beautiful waters. It by no means was an intentional act and we will work with our members to ensure they understand the importance of due care and caution and proper maintenance to ensure no such event occurs again. Certainly this is not the image our club wants to leave with you or any other community when we visit.

- -Port Ludlow Marina will take your credit card to hold your reservation.
- -Upon docking, go to the Marina Office to register & show your RHYC Membership Card (you must show your 2019 membership card). Members must also fly their RHYC Burgee.
- -50% of your moorage fees/electrical will be paid for by RHYC and 50% will be paid by you (up to 2 nights per month). We have a debit account set up with Port Ludlow for RHYC's portion of the fees.
- -You are responsible for cancelling your reservation. If you do not cancel your credit card will be charged the full moorage rate not RHYC.

PLEASE, PLEASE - When you sign up for a cruise we want you to pay for the

cruise right away by either Credit Card on the website or mailing a check to RHYC C/O Michelle Nelson, 33650 6th Ave S. Suite 230, Federal Way, WA 98003. The cruise teams need to know how many people are coming so that they can start to organize and spend money for their cruise. The expenses may include entertainment, food, facility charges, decorations, moorage deposits, etc. The cruise teams are supposed to break even so at the time you sign up for the cruise you are committing to the cruise fee for that event. We have been asked about refunds in the past for people who are unable to attend the cruise. We know that sometimes plans change but it is up to the cruise team to decide if you are able to be given a refund based on expenses they have already incurred for their event. In addition, if you are adding guests, please sign up your guests and pay their cruise fee to the club before the event. If it is necessary for you to pay the cruise team at the event – PLEASE write a check – do not hand the cruise team cash. The cruise teams are usually very busy and when people hand them cash at the events it is often difficult for them to properly account for the money later. If you write a check, we have a better idea of who paid and we can account for the money received on Club Express. All cash and checks have to be posted manually to your club express account so that you do not show a balance owing to the club.

Past Commodore



Rules for posting an ad:


- All postings will be subject to an \$5 posting fee.

- Postings expire one month from the posting date or the last update.


