Rear Commodore Report

I have been getting calls or emails from some of you asking when marinas and reciprocals are opening. Changes are happening rapidly. Most of the marinas are opening but with limited moorage like only allowing 50% occupancy. It is wise to call ahead to the marinas you are thinking of visiting to see availability.

I called Roche Harbor last week and they said they were going to open June 17 or 23rd. The marina now says they are opening Monday but at 50% occupancy.

Reciprocals have not changed a lot. Some say they are opened but others not, so call ahead. You can get the most up today information on **Yachtdestinations.org**.

San Juan County announced that they have revised their previous travel advisory and are beginning to reopen and are welcoming visitors. They are now in Phase 2 of the Governor's "Safe Start" phased re-opening plan.

There are **very specific details** in this communication to include Island specific restrictions. They also mention that additional details will be coming in the next few days.

Below are some specifics from this announcement:

- This order applies to all transient overnight lodging in San Juan County, including hotels and motels, camping, moorage, and vacation rentals.
- Camping at state parks on the <u>ferry-served islands</u> will reopen at 50% capacity on June 8, if not sooner.
- Camping and staying overnight on docks and mooring buoys at state parks on <u>non-ferry-served islands</u> is allowed. Out of county boaters are requested to provision at their home ports and limit coming ashore on the ferry-served islands.
- In Phase 2, the wearing of face coverings is mandatory inside businesses, and when a 6-foot social distance may not be maintained outdoors.

Please bring "Bling" for decorating your boat – no prizes will be awarded, but you'll get bragging rights. According to a recent "press release" – There are no fireworks displays scheduled for the Puget Sound region.

On the move cruise "before Colors" is scheduled as an Official Cruise, so if you are planning on attending, call Fisherman Bay/Lopez Islander Resort (360-468-2233) and reserve a slip for that Wednesday July 29th. Our outstation is not available as a "no charge/free spot" that day. RHYC By-laws state that outstations can not be used for official cruises.

Our Colors cruise is happening, but details aren't available until after June 23 and we get updates from the Marina and San Juan County Health Office. Keep checking the website and watch for club emails. Also, there is a possibility of an After Colors cruise depending on the Canadian Border opening guidelines.

Recreational Boating Association of Washington. June 4th Meeting Report

June 4th Board meeting report from Randy McCoy, RBAW Delegate from RHYC.

Things are looking up! Of importance for many Puget Sound Boaters is that the San Juans are starting to open up for boating! Out of county boaters are requested to provision at their home ports and limit time ashore on the ferry-served islands. Overnight moorage is now open at 50% capacity in the ports and marinas on the 4 ferry served islands. Two of the states saltwater launch ramps were opened after RBAW had a meeting with the Deputy Mayor of Seattle and lobbied for them to be open. Canada is expected to open up sometime around the 21st. It is not known if they will require a 14 day quarantine at this time for visiting boats, but it was noted that they seem to be following the same schedule as the US roughly for boaters. Some other good news is that fuel has dropped significantly in price. in addition there is a Covid-19 resource page on the RBAW website at www.rbaw.org for updates for impacts to boaters and other RBAW news.


